
Proper and Collective Nouns

Proper nouns

Proper nouns are nouns that name a *particular* or *special* person, place or thing. Proper nouns always start with a **capital letter**. Λ

So, **house** is a *common noun* referring to anyone's dwelling, but **Houses of Parliament** is a *proper noun* because it refers to a particular building.



Similarly, fish is a *common noun* as it can refer to any fish, but Koi is a *proper noun* referring to one type of fish.

Your name is a proper noun. Other examples of proper nouns are the days of the week, the months of the year and place names.


Sentences can contain both proper nouns and common nouns. For example:


- ★ He plays *football* on **Saturday**.
- * London is the capital city of England.
- * Mrs. Sanders is my teacher.
- ★ Lambs are born in the Spring.
- * My favourite *author* is **Beatrix Potter**.
- * Her cat is called Bongo

Collective nouns

A collective noun is a noun that names a group of things, people or animals. For example:

- * A pack of dogs
- * A pod of dolphins
- ★ A class of children
- ★ A nest of vipers
